ACT DAY IS FEB. 27
Heads up parents, there will be no school for students in grades 9,10, and 12 on Tuesday, Feb 27 th. It is a waiver day for Maui High and Juniors will be taking the ACT on that day.

## What is the ACT?

The ACT is a national college admissions examination. ACT results are accepted by all four-year colleges and universities in the US.

The weight placed on ACT scores varies from school to school. Other important factors that schools consider in their admissions decisions are a student's high school GPA, academic transcripts, letters of recommendation, interviews and personal essays. For more specific information on the importance of ACT scores at a certain college, contact the admissions office directly.

## What does the ACT cover?

| Section | Questions | Time |
| :---: | :---: | :---: |
| English | 75 questions | 45 min |
| Math | 60 questions | 60 min |
| Reading | 40 questions | 35 min |
| Science | 40 questions | 35 min |
| Writing (optional) | 1 prompt | 40 min |

## How is the ACT different from the SAT?

Both ACT and SAT scores are used for college admissions and merit-based scholarships. The biggest differences between the tests are that the ACT has a Science Test, and there's one SAT Math Section for which you cannot use a calculator. Most colleges don't prefer one test over the other. Students are increasingly taking both the SAT and ACT.

Should students take the ACT more than once?
YES! Evidence shows that retaking these tests can improve a student's score. Many students who plan to attend college do in fact test at least twice, once as a junior and again as a senior. Students can choose which set of scores are sent to colleges or scholarship programs. ACT reports scores from only one test date per report.
Keep in mind that the ACT test issued to juniors on ACT Day is provided at no cost to the student. Exam fees do apply to additional testing. Information on all ACT and SAT available test dates, cost, and locations are available on our website in our College \& Career Center section.
**Students who qualify for free/reduced lunch may receive fee waivers for the SAT and ACT tests. Test fee waivers are also available through the federally funded TRIO programs. Go to B-100 for more info.

## How can students prepare?

Every year, in the weeks leading up to ACT DAY, Maui High initiates a Countdown to ACT Day. During this time our faculty conducts ACT PREP for students in their core subject classes. This special focus on ACT Prep is rolled out for all underclassmen (not just juniors) in order to build up a cam-pus-wide college and career ready culture and mindset.
Additionally, there are helpful links on our website that can help with ACT Prep. Visit our College \& Career Center section, click on ACT/SAT PREP.
Ultimately, the best way for students to prepare for the ACT, and for college in general, is to take challenging courses throughout high school.

## Test Day Reminders:

*Be well rested. Testing is approx. 4 hours long.
*Do not be late! Doors will close at 7:45am. To maintain a secure testing environment late admittance will not be granted.
*Lunch is delayed until testing is complete. Be sure to have some breakfast on the morning of the test!
*Testing rooms may get chilly. Bring a sweater.
*You'll need your ID, \#2 pencils, approved calculator.
